RETROSPECTIVE: ART & WAR

War in Georgia has just stopped, but tears are still there. Deeply shocked by witnessing the tragedy, Georgian artist **Soso Nadiradze** sadly confessed, "I probably will never be able to paint again..." This spoken by an artist with a rare gift "... to express happiness with such ease ..." — a remark of a young local visitor of Soso's recent personal exhibition.



A rather opposite spiritual reaction on a war had Dragan Sekaric, quoted as saing: "... I started to paint when I witnessed the beginning of the Bosnian war... This war was not an ordinary war, but a civil war... To see people change to the point where they long to destroy another human being that just yesterday was their friend is the worst form of witnessing... I had to paint... In moments of afflictions, it abates the pain and is a means of spiritual and material survival."



Paintings of both artists are on display at *Chancery Art Gallery* in downtown Bracebridge (Muskoka) in the past-summer retrospective "**Lazy Cottager.**" This show is offered for those Muskoka summer residents who missed summer exhibitions but now finally managed to leave their lake cottages, golf courses, tennis courts, yacht clubs, etc...

The show highlights the recent gallery exhibits, including artwork of **Pat Fairhead, March Gregoroff**, **Hawa Kaba**, **John Kokkinos**, **Andrea Maguire**, **Valeria Mravyan**, **Soso Nadiradze**, **Dragan Sekaric** and **Leon Soriano**.

In addition to the summer retrospective, the exhibition also introduces a new gallery artist, **Mike Bell** – an art professor from England, who rarely uses a brush; but uses a finger, knife, trowel, sand, spray paints as well as builder's materials to create impasto surfaces on his seascapes. Mike Bell extensively exhibits in UK, Europe, Australia, UAE and USA, and now for the first time his work is available to Canadians.

From the Freudian view, arts derive from the same source as fantasies and dreams, and have the same purpose - to reduce tension in the soul. This applies to both creation and perception of the art, regardless of modality - painting, sculpture, literature, music, dance, etc. Thus, in some respects artists are not special - like the rest of us, they have the same narcissistic desires and fantasies, rather shameful to share under our cultural restraints. But unlike us, artists have a very special gift they are able to exhibit their fantasies in a skilful, camouflaged way, and to attract us first with the external, formal side of their work. It traps us, provoking a preliminary, properly aesthetic pleasure, turning our internal "censor" off guard. And then, it enables us to enjoy our own deep prohibited fantasies projected on the art - without shame and self-blame, with revealing catharsis. How are artists able to do this? It's their mystic secret; it's art.

Solo exhibition, watercolours: 2008 August 13 – 31 Chancery Art Gallery in downtown Bracebridge (MUSKOKA) Chancery 972

Opening Reception on Thursday, August 14 from 5 to 7 PM; The artist will speak at 6 PM.

BLOOMSBURY – a prominent and controversial group of British intellectuals of the first half of the twentieth century, whose work had deeply influenced modern literature, aesthetics, criticism and economics, as well as attitudes towards feminism, pacifism, and sexuality.

Charleston Farmhouse near London, a favourite place of the Bloomsbury gatherings, is now a Mecca for artists, writers and scholars from around the world. Distinguished Canadian painter, **Pat Fairhead** had visited it several times back in 90s. Her watercolour collection of the *Charleston Farmhous* garden with shadows of *Bloomsbery* members was exhibited in the US, but this will be its **first public show in Canada**.

Pat FAIRHEAD is an elected member of the *Royal Canadian Academy of Art*, and an active (and of the first women!) member of the famous *Arts and Letters Club* of Toronto, founded by members of the *Group of Seven*. Pat Fairhead is considered to be one of the top woman painters in Canada, her work can be found in *Windsor Castle*, many private and over 200 corporate collections.

DETAILS:

During the first half of the twentieth century, a few recent *Cambridge* graduates and their closest friends who happened to reside in the Bloomsbury district of London, England, would assemble on few nights a week for some drinks and conversation. Conversation about the nature of consciousness and its relation to external nature, about the fundamental separateness of individuals that involves both isolation and love, about the human and non-human nature of time and death, and about the ideal goods of truth love and beauty – all these underlie the group's dissatisfaction with capitalism and its wars of imperialism. Thus, this is how the "Bloomsbury Group" started, and later deeply influenced 20th century literature, aesthetics, criticism and economics, as well as attitudes towards feminism, pacifism, and sexuality.

Virginia Woolf was writing and publishing her modernist novels and essays and became one of the century's most famous feminist writers; Leonard Woolf, author of Imperialism and Civilization (1928), helped to formulate proposals for the League of Nations during the war; together the Woolfs founded the Hogarth Press, which published not only books of Verginia, but many other interesting thinkers, including Eliot and Mansfield, along with first standard English translations of Freud; Lytton Strachey wrote biographies of two Queens, Victoria and Elizabeth, published his critique of Victorianism in the shape of four ironic biographies (and biography has never been the same since); E. M. Forster completed A Passage to India which remains the most highly regarded novel on English imperialism in India and became one of England's most influential essayists; artist Roger Fry became England's greatest art critic; Duncan Grant and Vanessa Bell exhibited their art; Clive Bell applied Bloomsbury values to his book Civilization (1928); Desmond MacCarthy became perhaps the most widely read-and heard-literary critic with his columns in The Sunday Times and BBC broadcasts; John Maynard Keynes's The General Theory of Employment, Interest, and Money (1936) made him the century's most influential economist.

The establishment's hostility to post-impressionism made Bloomsbury controversial. Much criticism of Bloomsbury continues to center on the group's class origins, their elitism, satire, atheism, oppositional politics

and liberal economics, their non-abstract art, modernist fiction, and their non-nuclear family and sexual arrangements.

Bloomsbury artists rejected the traditional distinction between fine and decorative art, as can be seen at *Charleston Farmhouse* – favourite place of the Bloomsbury gatherings – where Vanessa Bell and Duncan Grant moved from London in 1916. Now the *Charleston Farmhouse* a Mecca for the intellectuals from around the world. Distinguished Canadian artist, **Pat Fairhead** had visited it several times back in 90s. Her watercolour collection of the *Charleston Farmhous* garden with shadows of Bloomsbery members was exhibited in the US, but this will be its **first public show in Canada**.

Pat FAIRHEAD is an elected member of the Royal Canadian Academy of Art, and an active (and of the first women!) member of the famous Arts and Letters Club of Toronto, founded by members of the Group of Seven. Pat Fairhead is considered to be one of the top woman painters in Canada.

Pat is a Master of Arts graduate and also holds a Master of Education. She has painted full time for the past 30 years. As well as private collections and art galleries, her work can be found in *Windsor Castle* and over 200 corporate collections.

Pat has camped in the Amazon jungle, hiked the Australian outback, climbed glaciers in New Zealand, sailed to Alaska, Labrador by freighter and made seven trips to the Arctic. Other adventures have taken her to Egypt, Crete, South Africa, Greenland, and Canadian canoe trips to the French River, North Shore Lake Superior and Desolation Sound, West Coast British Columbia.

Born in Yorkshire, England, Pat Fairhead came to Canada as a child. After living in Toronto most of her life, a few years ago she bought a house/studio in Muskoka. She continues to travel, paint, and teach the art.

Andrea MAGUIRE is a professional artist with MFA from *Norwich University* (USA). She has shown extensively in both Canada and Internationally, including exhibitions in the USA, Ireland and Japan.

"I am interested in 'process' in my work. It is in the application of various layers and the subsequent practice of scraping away that I come to the realization of my vision which is one in which I 'find' the elemental image. These layers provide the metaphoric archaeological or psychic strata which highlight the human condition at its most essential level, its essence."

Andrea works from her private studio in Toronto, where she also offers professional workshops for artists on "Mylar-Explorations of Surface," Mixed Media with Attitude," "Becoming Inspired," and "The Expressive Gesture."

Her art is in private and corporate collections, including *Ernst & Young, Dieckmann & Assoc.* (Chicago), *Magna International, Nesbitt-Burns* and *Ontario Hydro.*

In some of Andrea's canvases, one can probably detect a sway of Mark Rothko; On the subject matter, her leaning to the past, mythology and psychic archetypes perhaps reveal her sympathy to Carl Jung. Such a combination seems to generate rather interesting effect inviting to the intriguing "meditative" experience. Not surprisingly though, considering that meditation, dream, myth and art are deemed to have the same roots in the human psychological constitution.

HIS PAINTINGS ARE ALIVE...

ART & MUSIC FROM GEORGIA

TO CLARIFY: not from American state of Georgia, and not from the shores of Canadian Georgian Bay... It is from European country Georgia that rests on the shores of Mediterranean neighboring Black Sea, where the Argonauts from Greek mythology, in the years before the Trojan War, had voyaged for the Golden Fleece...

It is a tiny country of snow-capped mountains, fertile plains, verdant valleys and staggering abundance, with unique geography of alpine, desert and subtropical zone. Ancient culture of Georgia, with one of the Earth's original alphabets, is dating back to at least the 7th century BC.

In Georgian folk and church music the practice of polyphony (multi-voice harmony) dates back to the 7th century AD, three centuries before it appeared in Western Europe – the polyphonic singing simply stopped at Georgia's borders. An explanation has eluded musicologists for generations and remains a mystery to this day...

Just released CD "Songs of Georgia" by trio ZARI ("bell") is played during solo exhibition "THE VILLAGE" by Georgian painter Ioseb (Soso) Nadiradze at Chancery Art Gallery in Muskoka, downtown Bracebridge.

Ioseb (Soso) Nadiradze is a professional artist with Master's Degree from prestigious *Thilisi Academy of Fine Arts*. Besides the painting, he is an art designer at *Georgian Film* – movie company highly famed for its delicate artistic and philosophical concept (remember films of Otar Iosseliani?..)

Some critics note that works of Soso are somewhat reminiscent of Mark Chagall. Although Soso considers it as a pleasing compliment, he feels that his own artistic roots derived mainly from the frescos in ancient Georgian churches (as official religion, Christianity was adopted there as early as in 4th century, and cathedrals were decorated by Georgian native – not Byzantine – painters). Almost as his own "genetic memory," he undergoes the poetic and philosophical inspirations of Shota Rustaveli, the greatest Georgian intellectual of 12th century. Soso believes it is Niko Pirosmani (1862-1918) who has enabled him to apprehend that reality is actually not as apparent as it seems to appear...

"While I am painting, there are moments when my hand suddenly starts to move by itself, without "asking my permission." And after it finally returns back under my conscious control, it surprisingly seems like the painting is mostly completed... Such mysterious episodes do not last long (otherwise, it would be insanity), but this is what I actually define as 'Happiness'."

Some of his oils appear like ancient frescos, but feel absolutely contemporary. Some, on first glance, "abstracts" surprisingly turn into totally realistic Nudes. Viewers are puzzled: is there an intriguing love story behind the Cow pregnant with a Fish, or maybe better to apply here the Biblical interpretations based on symbols of early Christianity?

"Paintings are, in fact, living creatures: they breathe, think and talk, (although, in some inexplicable international tongue). That's why I suppose the artists should better keep silence, letting the art to speak instead," says Soso.

To note, his canvases seem to be alive indeed...

Ioseb (Soso) Nadiradze's paintings are in private collections across the Europe. After shows in Italy, Germany and Turkey, now for the first time his work can be seen in North America. For this exhibit "THE VILLAGE," Chancery Art Gallery has selected a cluster of oils with touch of irony over a simple joy of love and existence. Exhibition is on display during July 1-20.

Most of Muskoka residents had perhaps the only chance to see Shex's paintings as reproductions at *Gamay Noir* and *Pinot Gris* bottles on VQA shelves in LCBO (He was the winner of the *Hillebrand Wine Label Competition* in 2005).

When two of his original oils first appeared here recently at the international group show *Déjà Vu**, Muskoka fine art admirers and collectors were sincerely impressed. They craved to see and acquire more of this distinctive artist. Thus, it *will* be more:

From June 11 to 29, paintings of **Dragan Sekaric Shex** (Yugoslavia) will be show at his solo exhibition *"Broken Promise"* at *Chancery Art Gallery* in downtown Bracebridge.

Opening reception with the artist will be on Saturday, June 14, from 5 to 7 PM.

"Magical Realism" in the sfumato style

The term "Magical Realism" was originally used by art critic Franz Roh to define the new neo-realistic attitude in attempt to seize the mystery that breathes behind or within our everyday world. In literature, it is foremost associated with Latin American writers, like Marquez and Cortazar. Not without a good reason, Canadian journalist Ralph Benmerqui once applied the term "Magical Realism" to describe the paintings by Dragan Seckaric Shex...

Some critics believe that "... Sekaric's most original contribution to fine art is his modern use of the 'sfumato' style. Equally important is the emotional power in his work, which stands out in today's art dominated by design... 'Sfumato' in his paintings is the dominant style and an important part of the message. This style endows his paintings with a mystical, enigmatic character, and it portrays human figures as part of a larger world that denies them the defined worlds they once enjoyed and that gave them identity and importance" (Prof. Keith Ellis).

Yet, beside the exclusive technical aspect, one could detect an intriguing philosophical aspect pointing to the universal existential conflict, which the artist happened to endure on a deep level in his own life experience and transformation. He confessed:

"... I started to paint when I witnessed the beginning of the Bosnian war... This war was not an ordinary war, but a civil war... To see people change to the point where they long to destroy another human being that just yesterday was their friend is the worst form of witnessing... I had to paint... In moments of afflictions, it abates the pain and is a means of spiritual and material survival..."

Thus, originally trained with University degree from the *School of Architecture* in Sarajevo, Dragan slowly drifted from Architecture to Painting. He got away to Rome for advanced studies in fine art. After his Italian period of learning and art experimentation, he moved to Montreal. Currently Dragan works from his studio in Toronto.

Dragan Sekaric Shex has exhibited across the Mediterranean countries of Europe, in Cuba, US, and fine galleries of Montreal and Toronto; his canvases are presented in private collections around the world. He has received numerous professional awards and won the First Prize in several prestigious art contests.

For his first solo exhibition in Muskoka ("*Broken Promise*," June 11-29), *Chancery Art Gallery* has selected the paintings that seem to reflect the everlasting conflict between the expectation and reality.

Muskoka welcomes the first annual show for Young Artists of Northern Ontario



During February 15–23, Muskoka hosted an art show of **Young Artists of Northern Ontario** – *Ardour Eruption'08* – that becomes an annual charitable project for support of the young Canadians who sincerely believe that "Art Matters" and for providing some advantage to somewhat deprived "off-City" young citizens.

Of many applicants, twenty artworks from sixteen artists were selected for this show featuring oil, acrylic and gouache paintings, photography, clay and iron sculpture, and mixed media.

During the show and its two receptions, the young artists had a chance to receive a professional consultation from seasoned Muskoka artists and participate in workshop on "Tricky Psychology of the Artist-Gallery Interaction"; together with their parents and teachers, the students had an opportunity to discuss existential perspectives of growing in rural Ontario.

- Gord Adams, Muskoka District Chair, leaded the **Muskoka residents** jury panel; its *Certificate of Admiration* was granted to Courtlandt McQUIRE SWARTZ, 14, from Weston for his painting "Winter in Chesley."
- Prominent Canadian artist and educator Pat Fairhead, member of the Muskoka Arts & Crafts, chaired the **Muskoka artists** jury panel; its *Certificate of Distinction* was awarded to Jacqueline SWANEK, 22, a college fine art student from Barrie for her abstract "Peripheral Vision."
- Muskoka Galleries' Certificate of Recognition the jury panel managed by Kelly Holinshead, owner of the Shutterbug Gallery in Huntsville went to Jennifer BLACK, 17, from Gravenhurst for her mixed sculpture/photography piece "Anonymity."
- Steffani RUSSELL, 17, from Gravenhurst, received the *Certificate of Appreciation* from a sponsor* the Gallery affiliated psychology office for "Autism Puzzle," quilt/mixed media artwork, which was among the top selections of the juries.
